**Welcome Greetings by Mr Getachew Engida,

Nowadays, information and knowledge are key determinants of wealth creation, social transformation and human development. Language is the primary vehicle for communicating this information and knowledge, thus the opportunity to use one's languages on the Internet will determine the extent to which one can participate in emerging knowledge societies. Furthermore, linguistic diversity is an integral part of cultural diversity, enabling people from a variety of backgrounds to express their emotions, intentions, values and understanding, and providing a tool for achieving mutual understanding and respect. To this end, it promotes capacity-building at multiple levels, encouraging its Member States to develop encompassing language-related policies and allocate resources towards localized technological solutions that enable access to these knowledge societies.

I am confident that the Global Expert Meeting on Multilingualism in Cyberspace to be held in the Khanty-Mansiysk Autonomous Okrug – Ugra, Russian Federation from 4 to 9 July 2015, will be an important milestone in our work to promote linguistic and cultural diversity, and improve access to multilingual information and knowledge around the world.
